Congratulations to John Scalzi, the newest Robert A. Heinlein Award winner!



John Scalzi, novelist and internet personality, is the 2023 winner of the Robert A. Heinlein Award. The award is bestowed for outstanding published works in science fiction and technical writings that inspire the human exploration of space. This award is in recognition of Mr. Scalzi's body of work of 16 novels and numerous short stories. A majority of his work features a future in space for humanity including his groundbreaking novels in the Old Man's War series and the Interdependency series.

The award will be formally presented during opening ceremonies on Friday, May 26, 2023, 8:00 PM, for Balticon 57, the 57th Maryland Regional Science Fiction Convention. Balticon will take place at the Renaissance Baltimore Harborplace Hotel in Baltimore Maryland. Mr. Scalzi will participate in the Balticon program across Memorial Day Weekend.

Balticon and the Robert A. Heinlein Award are both managed and sponsored by The Baltimore Science Fiction Society, Inc. BSFS thanks The Heinlein Society and the family of Dr. Yoji Kondo for providing funding for this award.


The Robert A. Heinlein Award is a sterling silver medallion bearing the image of Robert A. Heinlein, as depicted by artist Arlin Robins. The medallion is matched with a red-white-blue lanyard. In addition, the winner receives two lapel pins for use when a large medallion is impractical, and a plaque describing the award for home or office wall display.

Jeanne Jackson has recently launched a new website, <a href="https://auntieaircraft.com">https://auntieaircraft.com</a>, to publicize her Wurst Contact series and give free, public access to Sourdough Jeanne's Space Flight Log, a tabular compilation of every attempted orbital or deep space launch since Sputnik 1 in 1957.

Jackson's series includes the titles *Into the Noisy Planet: It Came from the Radio Station*, *Toccata and Feud: Starship Troupers*, and *Parcel of Doom: The Kazoo of the Underworld*. These alternate-1970's-histories feature, as she describes it, "UFOs, the gods of Olympus (who are art collectors), the Grateful Dead (in mutated form--they're called the Warlocks), a struggling new college radio station, and LGBTQ themes. In writing these books, I took some inspiration (and much perspiration) from Robert Anson Heinlein, Robert Anton Wilson, and C.S. We are piloting a Library Blood Drive program where a member can, with the help of their local blood center and a few friends, coordinate a blood drive at a local library. This fiscal year, we've made 78 shipments already, totaling 39,586 books distributed. Since the program's inception, we've sent 38,555 total books to our heroes.



The Heinlein For Heroes program (H4H) sends free books to troops, veterans, and military families. We send only to individuals or units that have requested SF material. Clearly many of our military men and women WANT to read good science fiction, including Heinlein. To meet that demand, our shipments go around the globe, as well as to veterans' hospitals here at home.

Contributions keep coming in, but your help is still needed. We need gently used paperbacks—and especially Heinleins, as we include Heinlein books in every shipment.

Money contributions are used to buy books wherever we find them (book dealers, eBay) at the right price. But free is even better than cheap. Is an SF friend or neighbor downsizing?
