We had this nice letter come in from member Jim Roberts, sent to John Tilden.

I liked being approached to rejoin as a request rather than a high pressure sales job with a "Premium". Oh, I realize that I was sold- tack up another [cah-ching] but that's all right - I can have fun knowing that.

Part of my reason was to feel that I could replay to the email, particularly to the 'What am I Reading 15.0 with regards to *Starter Villain*, which I just finished and also more particularly with respect to John Scalzi. First on *Starter Villain*, I only started reading Scalzi with Kaiju *Preservation Society* but read his list of works and had some small idea of his range. *Starter Villain* hits some of the same 'notes' exploring human reactions and psychology through other species, and also the theme of the acceptance of monied evil in society. I enjoyed it thoroughly, hoped that it might be a series, and nearly cried when it wasn't. I hope he will revisit that world someday.

But regarding John Scalzi himself, I had the pleasure of briefly meeting him at the Southern Kentucky Book Fest in Bowling Green, KY last year and passed a few worlds with him. I am forever tongue-tied when it comes to speaking with authors. I know, intellectually, that unless they jump very high, they put on their pants one leg at a time, just like me but somehow my limbic system considers them as Superior Beings. In trying to know a bit about the author after reading *Kaiju*, I had done some basic research and learned of his friendship with Will Wheaton and one specific incident in which John had commissioned a painting of Will with a Rainbow Unicorn which painting was auctioned for charity. Will was also at SOKY Bookfest last year.

A small plot occurred to me, so I purchased a copy of *Kaiju* to be signed by John Scalzi and asked for the inscription to be "Jim - Curse you, Will Wheaton, and the Rainbow Unicorn you rode in on!". I explained that I had come upon the recounting of the Rainbow Unicorn and wanted to have my wife get in line for Will Wheaton and present him the inscription to read. John kindly acquiesced. The inscription was given to Will to read - and as he laughed, I snapped a picture of him with the book and my wife to his side, which I showed to John Scalzi and was able to see him chuckle. Mission Accomplished.

And that's both my only John Scalzi story AND my only Will Wheaton story- both gained for the princely sum of \$17.99.

We need local blood drive coordinators for the South Bay, San Francisco and Oakland, and Marin County. Also New England Coordinators are a critical need.

Coordinators in other areas are great. And Library Blood drives may soon become a Heinlein Society program so that there will be plenty for a coordinator to do. Cons may not be the only option.

Coordinating a blood drive is relatively easy. The blood center does most of the work before the drive. Except for the days of the drive, it is not time consuming. The rewards are huge. Each Unit of blood coordinated saves 3 lives at local hospitals. Best of all, you do not need to be eligible to donate to coordinate a drive. Even those with a fear of needles can Pay it Forward by coordinating a drive.


The H4H report for SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER 2023 and Fiscal year FY2024 is as follows:


